



Having collectively discovered the joys of hot pot, the Anchorage Fellows hosted a hot pot game night with the Americorps VISTAs and friends.



Sitka Fellows (and friends!) dressed as the Fellowship of the Ring for Halloween!


Anchorage Fellows at Halloween! Tiana (dressed as boba) won second place in the costume contest.
